


On the Trail Again Tennessee - Lawrenceburg, Linden, Jackson March 2011

Our destination was west Tennessee; we thought we would make it to Memphis for the night. We went through Lawrenceburg upon someone's suggestion that there was an antique store there. Going toward the center of town (we usually want to see the County Courthouse if there is one), we saw a period home with pots of geraniums already blooming. Ray noted that there was a sign for an antique store: **Mable's Antiques**. We rang the bell thinking we would find a variety of Tennessee furniture. Little did we know that we would find an incredible Victorian heaven. The rooms were filled with Meissen, Dresden, lamps, settees, etc. One cannot grasp the numbers of items unless you actually go there. Photos do not do it justice. More than that, Mable and her husband are delightful! Ray and I feel we have new best friends!



We spent all afternoon with Mable learning about her wonderful collection. Mable has local customers as well as customers from all over the nation; some of those customers are famous! We stayed the night in Lawrenceburg.

The next morning, we found Steve, the owner of **New Moon Antique Mall** on the square.



He was the Lawrenceburg welcoming committee. He shared the local history and other items of interest about Lawrenceburg. He was sooo excited that it was a 1963 series; apparently it is very important as to whether it is a "United States Note" or a "Federal Reserve Note".


Candy's Memories captured my attention because her memories were many of mine! You will love her collections.


